Webster University

Webster University:

Webster University is an international, multi-campus, independent and non-denominational, liberal arts university with undergraduate and graduate degree programs. The home campus of the University is located in St. Louis, Missouri. Founded in 1915 as a small private college, and accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools since 1925, Webster University has grown into an international network of campuses across the U.S., Europe, and Asia. Currently, the University enrolls over 20,000 students worldwide, including enrollments in its European, Chinese and Thai campuses.

In South Carolina, Webster University offers undergraduate degree completion programs in Psychology (B.A.) and Management (B.A.), as well as a variety of graduate degree programs in Business, Human Resources, and Counseling (M.A., M.B.A.).

Transfer Options - Webster University:

Students transferring to Webster University from the South Carolina Technical College System may choose one of the baccalaureate degree completion programs (B.A.) at our participating Metropolitan Campuses in South Carolina, elect to study at the main campus in St. Louis from a full range of programs of study, elect to study under one of the online baccalaureate degree completion programs, or elect to study at one of our worldwide campuses.

Admission Requirements to Degree Completion Program:

Webster University's upper-division degree completion programs in Psychology (B.A.) and Management (B.A.) are designed for students with the equivalent of two or more years of previous college-level work. When considering an application, Webster looks for evidence of potential for academic success. Applicants to our program should have completed an associate degree, or at least two years of college-level work (64 semester credit hours), with a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale. These transfer courses should include at least one college-level writing or composition class, and one college-level mathematics course. While the above profile is recommended, each applicant will be given a thorough individual review.

Transfer Policies:

The University accepts up to a maximum of 98 semester hours of transfer work from other accredited institutions, of which no more than 64 lower-division credit hours may be transferred from a community college, standardized tests, or other lower-division institutions, unless that credit is part of a completed associate's degree. The University provides full transfer of coursework successfully completed as part of an associate's degree program from a regionally accredited institution. These courses must be college-level (numbered 100 or above) and have been completed with a grade of "C" or better.

The University also accepts credits earned through standardized exams such as CLEP, ACT-PEP, DANTES, USAFI, etc. Webster University also follows the credit recommendations of the American Council of Education (ACE) for various corporate and military training programs.

Transfer with the Associate of Arts Degree (A.A.):

Webster University accepts in transfer coursework completed as part of the Associate in Arts (A.A.) degree from the South Carolina Technical College System. Students completing the community college's general education program will not be required to complete additional lower-division general education coursework at Webster University, and will have satisfied Webster University's general education requirement (please see section titled *Important General Education Notice* on page 5). Course equivalencies for requirements in the major are determined by the appropriate academic departments. See the various transfer guides for more specific information.

<u>Transfer with the Associate in Science Degree (A.S.):</u>

Webster University accepts in transfer various coursework completed as part of the Associate in Science (A.S.) Degree from the South Carolina Technical College System. Students completing the community college's general education program will not be required to complete additional lower-division general education coursework at Webster University, and will have satisfied Webster University's general education requirement (please see section titled *Important General Education Notice* on page 5).

Transfer with the Associate in Applied Science, major in Nursing:

Webster University accepts in transfer various coursework completed as part of the Associate in Applied Science, major in Nursing degree from the South Carolina Technical College System. Students will still be required to fulfill the 27 semester credit hour general education curriculum requirement. Depending on the student, it is possible that some of the general education requirements will be fulfilled with the associate degree, but a transcript evaluation by the Webster University Registrar's Office will determine what additional coursework is needed to fulfill this requirement.

Transfer without the Associate's Degree:

Webster University will generally accept up to 64 semester credit hours in community college coursework numbered 100 or above and completed with a grade of "C" or better towards completion of a Bachelor's Degree. Evaluation of transfer credit is conducted by the Office of the University Registrar.

GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS:

A. Equivalencies:

ASSOCIATE'S DEGREE: Students who have completed the Associate in Arts Degree (A.A.) or the Associate in Science Degree (A.S.) at a South Carolina community college will have satisfied the equivalent of Webster University's general education program and are not required to complete additional lower-division general education coursework. Other associate degrees may have to fulfill Webster University's general education curriculum requirement (see above).

ALTERNATE PROGRAM: Students who have completed an approved general education program, including the CBHE Model in Missouri or IGETC in California, will have satisfied Webster University's lower-division general education requirements. In addition to this, students who have completed an approved alternative general education program, including Honors Programs and Interdisciplinary Programs may be considered as satisfying Webster University's lower division requirements. Completion of the general education program must be verified or documented on the sending institution's official transcript.

B. Requirements:

Generally, students at Webster University satisfy the general education requirement by taking one three-credit-hour course in each of the following areas: critical thinking, communications, historical consciousness, humanities, values, cultural understanding, arts appreciation, scientific understanding, and mathematics. Students complete each course with a grade of "C" or better in each category (27 credit hours minimum). This requirement may be met with transfer coursework, with an equivalent general education program (see above), or by taking liberal arts coursework at Webster University.

IMPORTANT GENERAL EDUCATION NOTICE: Webster University is phasing in a new general education curriculum, the Global Citizenship Program. This aligns the University's general education curriculum with its mission, which is to ensure high quality learning experiences that transform students for global citizenship and individual excellence. Effective 2014-2015 transfer students with fewer than 75 college credit hours will begin to follow requirements of the Global Citizenship Program. In 2015-2016, the Global Citizenship Program will apply to all new students. Please note that under the Global Citizenship Program, all students are required to complete a Keystone Seminar at Webster University. Please speak with your Webster Admissions Counselor or Program Coordinator for more information.

Admission Procedures: To enroll as a degree-seeking student, applicants must first apply for admission to the University. The application process requires that the following credentials be submitted to the Office of Undergraduate Admissions:

- A completed and signed application form
- A \$35 nonrefundable application fee
- A 300-500 word essay on topic of the applicant's choice
- A resume that details professional employment history, school and/or community activities, honors and awards
- An <u>official</u> transcript from each college, university or other postsecondary institution showing all work attempted to date.

Degree Completion Program

Webster University offers an undergraduate degree-completion program (B.A. degree) in Management at the Charleston, Columbia and Greenville Metropolitan Campuses. Our Bachelor of Arts program has been designed to meet the needs of adults who require a college program which is flexible, work-related, and academically strong. Coursework in Webster's program emphasizes immediate and practical applications as well as theory. Students work with other adults in classes and seminars using case studies, lectures, simulations, individual projects, and small group discussions.

For admission into this program, students should generally meet one of the following descriptions:

- a. Have completed an Associate's Degree (A.A., A.S.), or
- b. Have completed a minimum of 64 semester credit hours of college-level work with a GPA of 2.5
- c. Students with other associate degrees (Associate of Business, Associate of Public Services, Associate of Nursing) can be admitted to the degree completion programs, but will be required to fulfill Webster University's minimum general education requirements (see *General Education Requirements*).

Degree Requirements:

Graduation requirements include the completion of at least 128 semester credit hours, completion of the requirements for the major, completion of the general education requirements, satisfaction of the residency requirements, and maintenance of a minimum GPA of 2.0. The minimum residency at Webster University is 30 credits, of which no less than 18 hours must be in the major.

The minimum residency at Webster University is 30 credits, of which no less than 18 hours must be in the major-
