RATIONALE

Why do I need this course?

Welcome to the course: Criminal Law 1 CRJ-115

This course covers the fundamental principles of substantive criminal law. It will examine the basic elements of crimes, including actus reus and mens rea; some general doctrines of criminal liability, such as complicity, causation, attempt, and conspiracy; an example of substantive crime grading (homicide); and defenses to crime. We will study the reasons for punishing convicted criminals, as well as the elements of crimes and the defenses that the accused might raise. We will examine tensions between various state statutes, the common law, and the Model Penal Code. Although you will be responsible for learning criminal law doctrine, it is equally important for you to learn to make the best legal argument on each side of a case and to analyze the policy reasons for embracing or criticizing current laws. The course will cover common law formulations, a variety of state and federal statutory codifications (with particular attention to SC law), and the Model Penal Code.

- Recognize the roles that judicial common law, legislatively-enacted statutes, and the Model Penal Code have played in the development of the criminal law, and appreciate how and why criminal laws may be changed
- Understand how state and federal law interact with regard to crimes
- Understand and articulate the significance of the 1st, 2nd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 8th, and 14th Amendments as they pertain to criminal laws
- Demonstrate an understanding of case analysis and statutory construction.
- Explain the concept of punishment, mens rea and actus rea
- Explain what is meant by "reasonable doubt".
- Explain the elements of the insanity defense, self-defense and related defenses.
- Discuss the defenses of infancy, intoxication, duress, necessity, entrapment, and excessive government involvement.
- Examine the scope of one's accountability for the criminal acts of others.
- Discuss the crime of conspiracy.
- Explain know the elements of the crime of homicide.
- Discuss the elements of SC crimes of sexual assault, battery, assault, aggravated assault and battery, mayhem, kidnapping, and larceny, obtaining property by false pretenses, forgery, receiving stolen goods, robbery, extortion, burglary, arson, property destruction

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offenses, fraud, and related offenses, robbery, burglary, and criminal trespass, public order, and indecency
