# **RATIONALE**

# Why do I need this course?

This course is intended as an introduction to the American Correctional System. The course will present what effect the correctional system has on the inmates, community, and public. In addition, displays the major levels of corrections in contemporary America and specify some of the major responsibilities prison administration has to inmates in their custody. Students will be able to explain the practical aspects of prison organization and administration in the correctional system. and will provide an overview of current institutional practices, policies, and legal issues. The course focuses on the relation of corrections to the criminal justice system, theories underlying correctional practice, and the role of institutions within the corrections system. It reviews the historical development of crime and corrections, sentencing, jails, prisons, correctional policies, agencies, prison life, and challenges facing correctional populations. It will further explore the principles and practices of treatment accorded to offenders in various types of correctional settings.
