CLERY ACT REQUIREMENTS

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Crime Statistics Act (Clery Act) requires colleges and universities to:

- Publish and distribute to all enrolled students and current employees through appropriate publications and mailings an Annual Security Report (ASR) every year by October 1st that contains three (3) calendar years of campus crime statistics and certain campus security policy information;
- Provide a notice to all prospective students and employees that describes the ASR's availability and that a paper copy is available if the ASR is posted online;
- Disclose crime statistics for all the Piedmont Technical College Campuses, public areas immediately adjacent to or running through campuses, and certain non-campus properties;
- Provide "Timely Warning" notices of those crimes that have occurred and pose an "ongoing threat to students and campus activities;"
- Provide "Emergency Notifications" for dangerous or emergency situations; and
- Disclose in a public crime log any crime that occurred on campus, on non-campus property, or on public property and is reported to the PTC Campus Police.

Piedmont Technical College is required by the Clery Act to report certain types of crimes on an annual basis. These crimes include:

- Arrests and Disciplinary Referrals for Violations of Weapons, Drug, and Liquor Laws

PTC Campus Police and Security Department is responsible for preparing and distributing the Annual Security Report (ASR). The ASR crime statistics are provided in this report, and are also available on the PTC Campus Police and Security Department website at the following link: https://www.ptc.edu/college-resources/campus-police-and-security. The Campus Police and Security Department works with many other departments within the campus community to compile the information obtained in this report. In addition to working with internal partners, crime statistics are requested from other law enforcement agencies who have jurisdiction on campus to include the Greenwood County Sheriff's Department, the

City of Newberry Police Department, the Abbeville County Sheriff's Department, the Saluda County Sheriff's Department, the City of Edgefield Police Department, the City of McCormick Police Department and the Laurens County Sheriff's Department. Documentation of requests and information from other law enforcement agencies are available in the PTC Campus Police and Security Department.

The PTC Campus Police and Security Department encourages members of the PTC community to use this report as a guide for safe practices on and off campus. For a hard copy of this information or alternative formats please contact the PTC Campus Police and Security Department at (864)941-8563.

The PTC Campus Police and Security Department maintains a written crime log that records, by date, the crime that was reported to have occurred within the Clery geography. The crime log includes the nature, date, time, and general location of each crime and the disposition of the complaint, if known. The crime log is open for public inspection during normal business hours and includes the crimes reported for the most recent 60 days.

CAMPUS POLICE DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW AND AUTHORITY

The PTC Campus Police and Security Department employs state law enforcement officers and contracted state certified security officers. The state law enforcement officers (Police Officers) that work for the department are Group 1 State Constables, and graduates of the S.C. Criminal Justice Academy Basic Law Enforcement Training (BLE) program in Columbia, South Carolina. The contract Security Officers employed by the College are state-certified by the State Law Enforcement Division (SLED). Both Police Officers and Security Officers have authority to apprehend and arrest anyone involved in illegal acts oncampus and areas immediately adjacent to the PTC campuses. If minor offenses involving College rules and regulations are committed by a college student, the campus police and security may refer the student to the PTC Office of Student Affairs. The PTC Campus Police and Security Department personnel work closely with local, state and federal agencies and campus police officers have direct radio contact with local police and sheriff dispatch and communication centers.

REPORTING CRIMINAL OFFENSES

All students, employees, and visitors should promptly report criminal incidents, accidents and other emergencies to the PTC Campus Police and Security Department by dialing extension 8000 on campus, or by calling (864) 941-8000. This number can be called twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week on a year-round basis. PTC phones are located in offices and hallways throughout the PTC campuses. There are also emergency call boxes throughout the campus for use when emergency assistance is needed.

In accordance with the Clery Act certain employees on campus are recognized as "campus security authorities" (CSAs) because they have significant responsibility for students and campus activities. Students and employees may report criminal offenses to CSAs, who are required to report any reports of criminal activity to the Campus Police and Security Department. When the Campus Police and Security Department is made aware of possible criminal activity there will be an immediate response to investigate the situation. The Campus Police and Security Department works closely with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies as needed during these investigations.

If you are the victim of a crime and do not want to pursue action within the College system or the criminal justice system, you may still want to consider making a confidential report. With your permission, the Campus Police Officer can file a report on the details of the incident without revealing your identity. The purpose of a confidential report is to comply with your wish to keep the matter confidential, while taking steps to ensure the future safety of yourself and others. Reports filed in this manner are counted and disclosed in the annual crime statistics for the institution.

PTC does not employ pastoral counselors, but employs professional counselors to whom students may wish to speak. If appropriate, the counselors may advise the persons being counseled that they may report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the ASR.

ALERTING THE COLLEGE COMMUNITY

The Piedmont Technical College (PTC) has a number of different ways it can rapidly disseminate information in the event of an emergency, as well as non-emergency situations causing a significant and real or perceived threat to the campus community.

PTC utilizes a text message alert system called Blackboard Connect. This messaging system sends alert via text messages to all parties which have not voluntarily opted-out of the system. PTC can also send a broadcast e-mail to everyone who has a College e-mail account and any affiliated individual who has provided an e-mail address. Outside building announcements can be made in certain areas via the PTC early warning siren system. PTC may also utilize banners on the main website, social media, and other means of communications if available, depending on the type of incident requiring notification.

Timely Warning

PTC will issue a "Timely Warning" to notify the campus community of any Clery crimes that occurred or are occurring anywhere on PTC's Clery geography that are considered to be, in the judgement of the Director of Campus Police and Security or his or her designee, a serious or continued threat to students and employees. Examples of crimes where timely warnings may be issued include, but are not limited to: sexual assaults, robbery, or aggravated assaults. Distribution of this type of warning is typically done by way of broadcast e-mail and or text messaging.

Emergency Notification

PTC will issue an "Emergency Notification" to immediately notify the campus community upon confirmation of a significant emergency or dangerous situation involving an immediate threat to the health, safety and or security of students and employees on campus. Examples of such significant emergencies or dangerous situations include, but are not limited to, active shooter on campus or tornado warnings. This type of notification is typically through a combination of messaging systems.

Emergency Response and Evacuation

The Campus Police and Security Department will contact the President of PTC in the event of a significant or dangerous situation. After reviewing the situation, and if appropriate, the Campus Police and Security Department will confer with local law enforcement or other first responders, to confirm the issue(s) involved and determine if activation of the Emergency Notification system is warranted.

PTC conducts drills and exercises each year to assess and evaluate its emergency plans and capabilities. During these processes PTC involves and works with numerous different departments on campus, and off-campus agencies. The PTC Campus Police and Security Department maintains a Comprehensive Emergency Operations Plan for the College. This plan is meant to serve as a guide for all College personnel in the event of an emergency at or near one of the College's campuses. While no plan can cover every possible situation or emergency, this guide describes basic actions necessary to protect personnel and property and to enhance the capability of the College's response in coordination with local emergency response agencies. BUILDING SECURITY AND ACCESS

PTC is a public institution and open to the public. Access to certain areas may be restricted as needed. In order to maintain the safety of the campus community, the college has the ability to restrict, withhold, or

remove a person's access to or presence on college property due to safety considerations relating to the college community.

PTC is committed to campus safety and security. Exterior lighting and landscaping control is a critical part of that commitment. Representatives from various departments continually conduct security surveys to ensure campus lighting is adequate and that the landscaping is appropriately controlled. Officers with the PTC Campus Police and Security Department conduct routine checks of lighting on campus during regularly assigned patrol duties. If lights are out or dim, officers will initiate a work order. PTC Campus Operations works to identify and repair inoperative locking mechanisms, and maintenance staff are available to respond to calls for service regarding unsafe facility conditions or for personal safety and property protection. Any community member who has a concern about facility safety and security should report this concern to the PTC Campus Police and Security Department by calling (864)941-8000 or by emailing the department at ptcpolice@ptc.edu.

CRIME PREVENTION AND SECURITY AWARENESS

Crimes can occur at PTC just as they can occur anywhere. Preventing crime is a shared responsibility of the entire college community. If you are the victim, witness, or have knowledge of a crime or suspicious activity, you should immediately contact the Campus Police Department by calling (864)941-8000.

The Campus Police Department provides awareness and crime prevention training periodically throughout the year. Information on these programs and on basic crime prevention and safety tips are available on the Campus Police Department's website. A common theme of all awareness and crime prevention training is to encourage students and employees to be aware of their responsibility for their own security and the security of others. In addition to training sessions, information on these topics is disseminated to students and employees through various means to include literature, displays and e-mail communication. The Office of Student Affairs serves as a resource for students as well, providing materials and assistance with crime prevention and related topics.

OFF-CAMPUS STUDENT ORGANIZATIONS

At the present time, PTC does not have any off-campus student organizations.

ALCOHOL AND ILLEGAL DRUGS

The South Carolina Technical College system prohibits the unlawful manufacturing, distribution, possession or use of illegal drugs and alcohol at the workplace and in the educational setting. It is the policy of the College to provide a drug-free, healthy, safe and secure work and educational environment. It is unlawful to sell, furnish, or provide alcohol to a person under 21 years of age. It is a violation of College policy for anyone to consume or possess alcohol in any public or private area of campus without prior College approval. Organizations, groups, or individuals violating alcohol and substance policy or laws may be subject to sanctions by the College. All South Carolina laws will be followed relating to drug and alcohol enforcement.

Student Disciplinary Procedures

The Office of Student Affairs will handle student disciplinary procedures. Because due process is essential in dealing with infractions of College regulations, any disciplinary actions taken and sanctions imposed on a student will follow the PTC Student Code which can be found in the Student Handbook at the following link:

If a situation requires sanctions, the following sanctions could be imposed: reprimand, special conditions, disciplinary probation, loss of privileges, suspension from the college, expulsion from the college, additional measures. Additional information on sanctions and related process and procedure can be located in the Student Handbook and or by contacting the Office of Student Affairs.

SEX OFFENSES

Piedmont Technical College, in compliance with the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) of 2013, and the Campus Sexual Violence (SaVE) Act, Section 304, educates the student and College community about sexual harassment, sexual assault, rape, acquaintance rape, stalking, dating violence and domestic violence. In addition to ongoing prevention and awareness campaigns for students and employees, programs are offered on bystander intervention that explore the safe and positive options that may be used to help other students and employees. These issues are addressed by providing students with information on these topics by way of literature. Additionally, PTC provides workshops on these topics, and online modules on these topics are assigned to students and employees to complete. This information is covered in orientations, and the Campus Police Department offers sexual assault education and information programs to students and employees upon request. Literature on sexual harassment and assault including prevention, support, information and actions to take if an incident occurs, is outlined in the PTC Student Handbook and available at the Office of Student Affairs. PTC prohibits dating violence, domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking.

Any student, or other member of the college community, who believes that he or she is or has been a victim of sexual harassment or sexual violence may file a report with the College's Chief Student Services Officer, the Campus Police and Security Department, or with the College's Title IX Coordinator, or designee. The following definitions are provided in the Student Handbook which is provided to students, and can be located at the following link: https://www.ptc.edu/college-resources/student-policiesprocedures. Sexual Assault is defined as actual or attempted sexual contact with another person without that person's consent. Consent is explicit approval and permission to engage in sexual activity demonstrated by clear action, words, or writings. Consent must be informed, voluntary, and mutual, and can be withdrawn at any time. Sexual Violence is a broader term than sexual assault. The term encompasses sexual homicide, rape, incest, molestation, fondling, stalking, intimate partner violence, and verbal harassment of a sexual nature. Stalking is defined as repeatedly following, harassing, threatening, or intimidating another by telephone, mail, electronic communication, social media, or any other action, device, or method that purposely or knowingly causes substantial emotional distress or reasonable fear of bodily injury or death to the targeted person or a member of their family. Domestic Violence is defined as a felony or misdemeanor crime of violence committed by a current or former spouse or intimate partner or other person who is cohabitating or has cohabitated with the victim as a spouse or intimate partner or by any other person who commits a crime of violence against a victim who is protected under the domestic or family violence laws. Dating Violence is violence committed by a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with the victim.

If you are a victim of a sexual assault at this institution, your first priority should be to get to a place of safety. In addition:

- Do not shower, bathe, or destroy any clothing you were wearing at the time of the attack;
- Go to a hospital emergency room for medical care;

- Call someone to be with you; you should not be alone; and
- You are also encouraged to preserve evidence by saving text messages, instant messages, etc.

The Piedmont Technical College Police and Security Department strongly advocates that a victim of sexual assault report the incident in a timely manner. A Campus Police Officer will assist the victim in notifying law enforcement if requested. Time is a critical factor for evidence collection and preservation. An assault should be reported directly to a Campus Police Officer and or the Office of Student Affairs, although this is not required. Filing a police report will not obligate the victim to prosecute, nor will it subject the victim to scrutiny or judgement from officers. Filing a report will:

- Ensure that a victim of sexual assault receives the necessary medical treatment and tests, at no expense to the victim;
- Provide the opportunity for collection of evidence helpful in prosecution, which cannot be obtained later; and
- Assure the victim has access to free confidential counseling specifically trained in the area of sexual assault crisis intervention.

The Title IX Coordinator will receive annual training related to domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking as well as how to conduct an investigation and the hearing process that protects the safety of victims and promotes accountability.

As noted in the Student Handbook, the Title IX Coordinator or designee will take appropriate measures when responding to a victim of sexual assault, including the imposition of a no-contact order and/or employment, transportation, residence, and academic modifications. Any accommodation measures provided to the victim will remain confidential as long as such confidentiality will not impair the ability of the institution to provide accommodations or protective measures. Where applicable, victims will be advised of their rights and the institution's responsibilities for orders of protection, "no contact" orders, restraining orders, or similar lawful orders issued by a court or by the institution. The victim will also be apprised of the existing counseling, health, mental health, victim advocacy, legal assistance, visa and immigration assistance, student financial aid, and other services available for victims.

Sexual Assault on Campus

Report immediately to Campus Safety/Police at ext. 8000 (on campus) or (864)941-8000. Give Campus Police/Safety as much of the following information as you can.

- Your exact location
- Your name and the phone number from which you are calling
- The severity of your injuries
- Pertinent details where it occurred, how long ago,
- Information about the offender—name (if known), description, direction of flight,
- description of vehicle (color, make, license plate number)
- Do not disturb the crime scene.

The campus will be searched immediately for suspects, outside law enforcement agencies will be

contacted for assistance, and a timely search for the suspect will be communicated in the campus community and in the surrounding area. The alert will be initiated by whatever means necessary to communicate the pertinent information to the campus community. The victim's name and personal information shall remain confidential. Disciplinary proceedings will be initiated when a student or employee is accused of a sexual assault on any PTC properties. Both the accuser and the accused are entitled to due process, and both will be notified simultaneously of the outcome on any disciplinary actions. VIOLENCE ON CAMPUS

It is the goal of Piedmont Technical College to promote a safe, respectful, and proactive work environment in which to deliver quality academic programs and public service activities. To this end, PTC will not tolerate, condone, or ignore workplace violence. Each department head, manager, supervisor, and employee is responsible for keeping the workplace free of violence. This includes intimidating, hostile, threating, or violent behavior by employees or non-employees (venders, job applicants, visitors, spouses, etc.) against self, others, College property owned by third parties but present on College premises. Any person, who experiences, observes or has knowledge of actual or threatened workplace violence has the responsibility to report the situation immediately to Campus Police at ext. 8000 or (864)941-8000.

Piedmont Technical College will follow State Law Title 16, Chapter 23, Section 430 of the South Carolina Code laws concerning firearms on any PTC property. Any person found to be in violation of these statutes is subject to prosecution to the fullest extent of the law. Knives with a blade over 2" long are illegal on campus.

PREVENTION TIPS

Be aware of your surroundings. Survey the entire area as you walk to your vehicle or outside of buildings. If you feel uncomfortable, call Campus Police and Security for an escort at ext. 8000 or (864)941-8000. Develop a "what if" mentality that allows you to make a plan for how to escape a bad situation. It is best to be prepared for anything.

DON'T

- Work alone in isolated settings, especially on week-ends, holidays, or late at night.
- Prop doors or windows open, or leave keys and other personal items lying around your office or campus.

DO

- Avoid isolated or dark places where you cannot summon help. Stay with a group of friends in well-lit areas.
- Observe others in the area before leaving a building. Report strangers or unusual events to Campus Police and Security immediately

- Call Campus Police for an escort if you cannot avoid walking alone.
- Avoid one-on-one meetings with acquaintances or strangers
- Lock your vehicle doors and keep valuables out of sight. When approaching vehicles, look for people hiding beneath or in rear seats or in bushes nearby.
- Call Campus Police if you have car trouble. Use emergency phones if necessary.
- Have a plan of action if you find yourself in a threatening situation. Be prepared to run, scream, or even resist attack. Keep your cell phone charged up and ready for use if you need assistance.

IF YOU SEE A SUSPICIOUS PERSON OR SUSPECT A CRIME

Safety and security on campus is a shared responsibility. If you are a victim, witness, or have knowledge of a crime, you should immediately report the crime or suspicious activity to Campus Police. Do Not assume someone else has reported the incident. Report the type of activity and give a specific description of the suspect(s). Including as much of the following information as you can provide:

- Location
- Number of suspects
- Sex, race, approximate age, build
- Clothing description
- Vehicle (color, make, license plate number)
